Students on Clinical Rotations

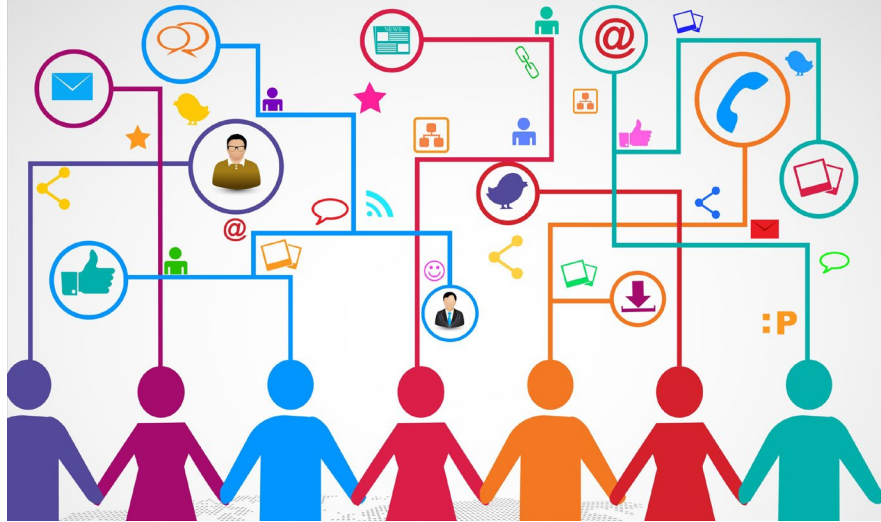


- Away from their support structure, family, classmates, professors

 - “Am I the only one experiencing these things at my clinic?”



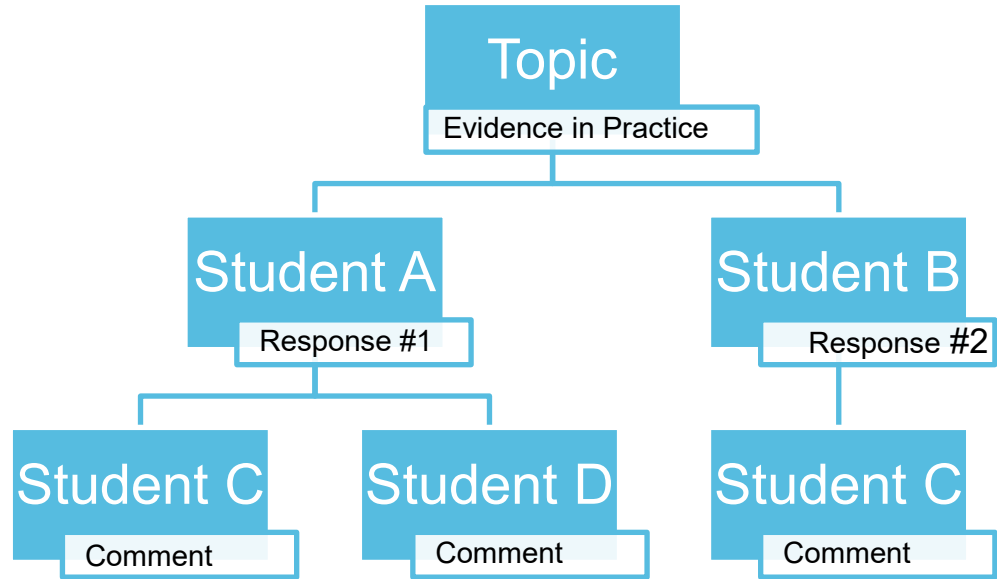

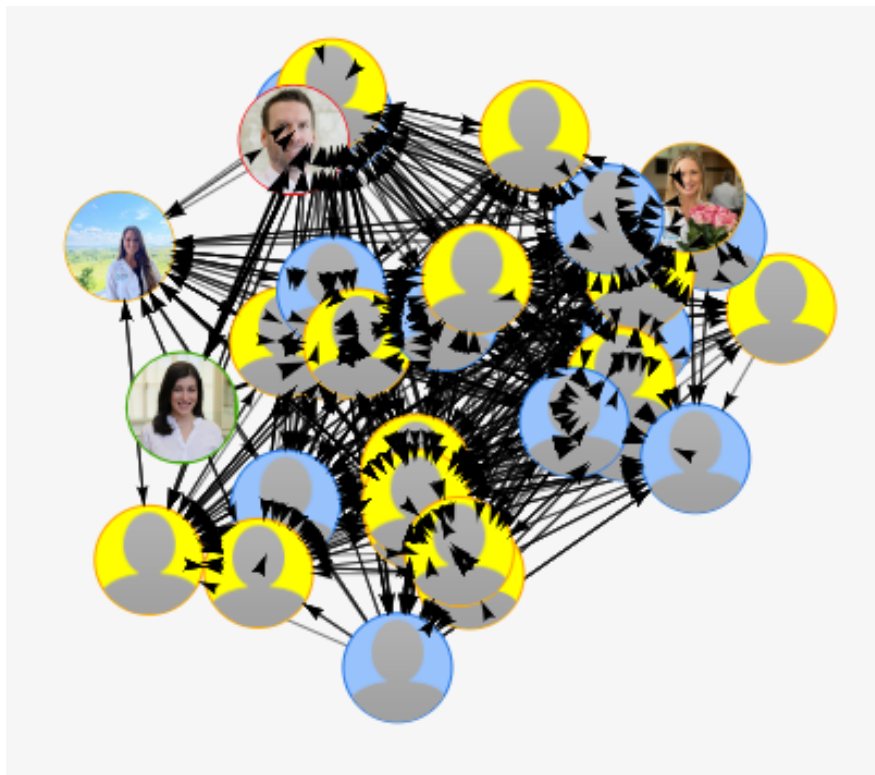
- Structured

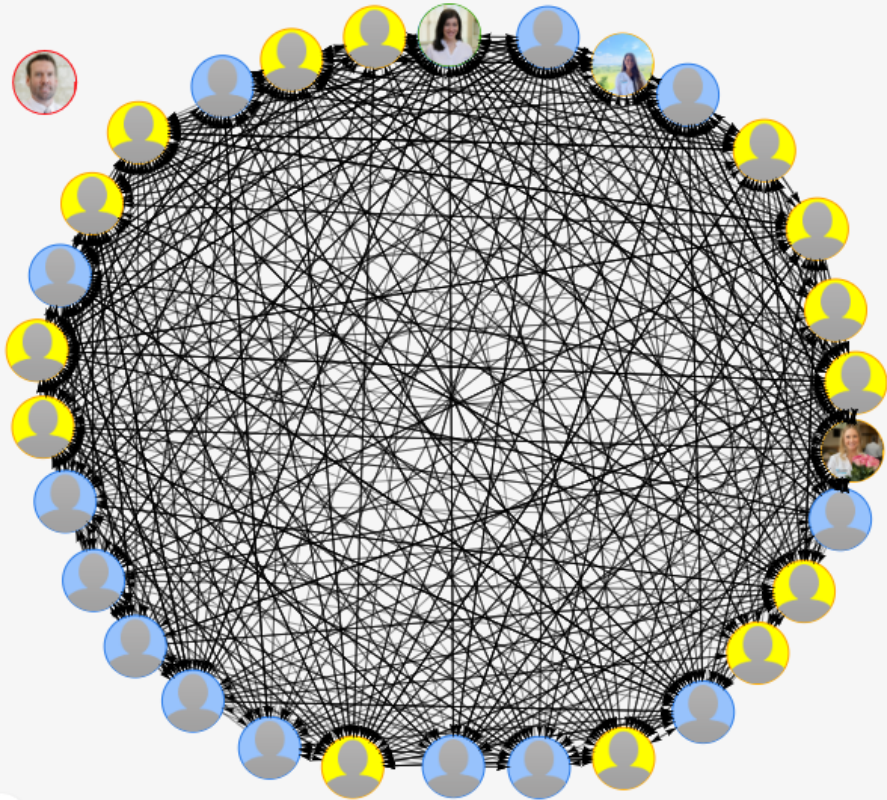

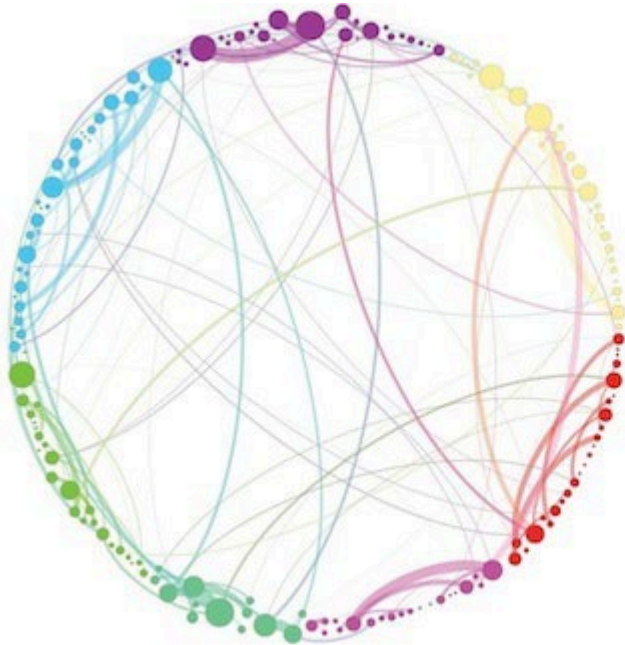

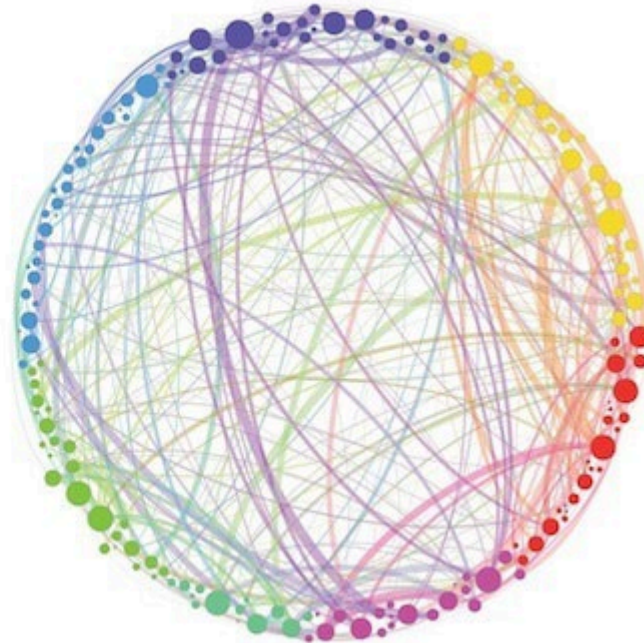
This is Your Brain on Discussion Boards

Interactive Platform- Yellowdig



- Specific topics created by course coordinator
 - Related to accreditation requirements
 - Tying the didactic courses to clinical experiential learning
 - Allow for other “General Questions” or “Undefined” posts
 - Off-Topic: students can connect
 - Supplement the clinical learning experience
- Student-led discussions
 - Course coordinator takes a hands-off approach
 - Let the students guide the conversations
 - Less pressure that the student is being “graded”
 - Interactive and engaging



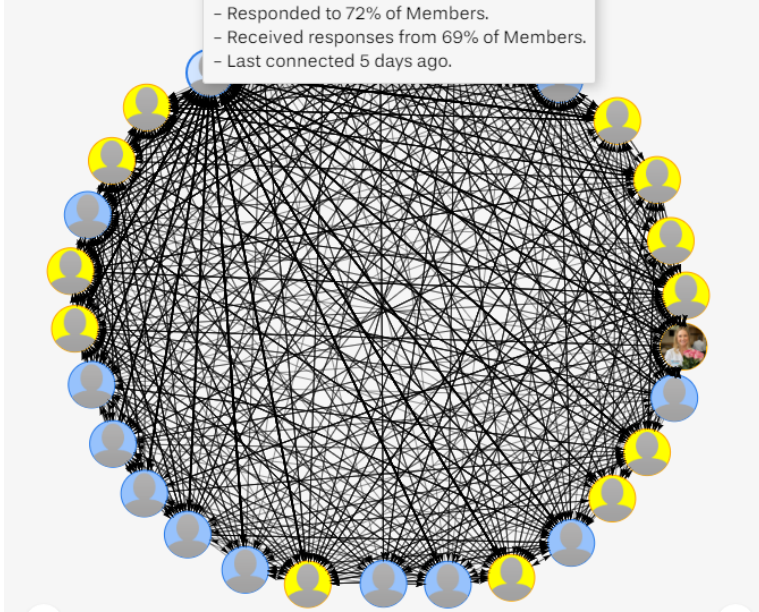
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Who Is Interacting?



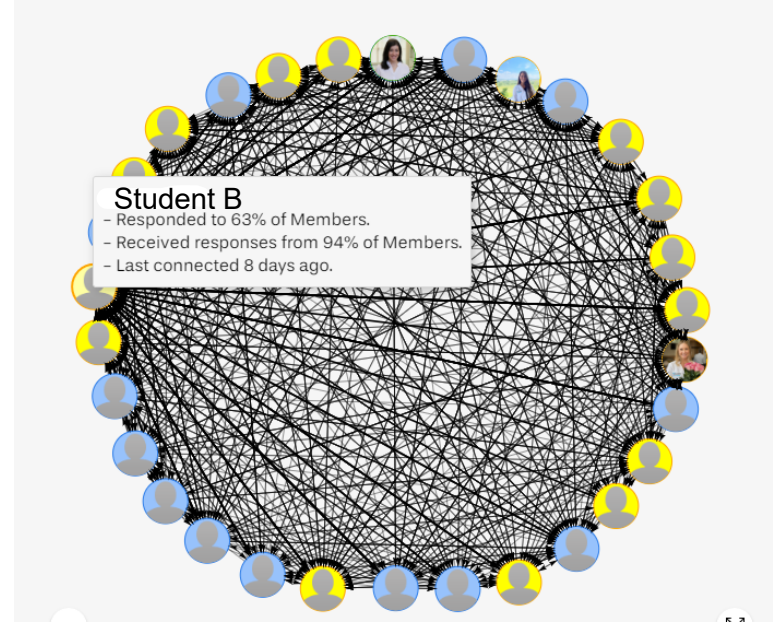
Student A

- Responded to 72% of Members.

- Received responses from 94% of Members.
- Last connected 8 days ago.



Students should earn >1000 pts/week

- Initial posts >40 words are given 380 pts
- Comments to an initial post >20 words are given 310 pts

- If people comment on your post, you earn 70 pts per comment, 55 pts per reaction

I recently used the CPR for thoracic manipulation for neck pain by Cleland on one of my patients who met 4/6 rules. I was able to successfully reduce his neck pain after performing a thoracic supine thrust manipulation and his pain was actually completely gone the next visit after a following up with his exercises. This was the first manipulation CPR I have used on my patients and thought was pretty cool to share. Have anyone else tried to use any CPR's recently to support your interventions?

VARIETY OF CARE AND BILLING



11/27/2022



In Inpatient rehab, we mainly target functional activities or a break down of a task to meet our patients goals for discharge to home or to the next level of care. Our top three billing codes we apply are Therapeutic Activities (97530), Therapeutic Exercise (97110), and Neuroreeducation (97112). We bill gait/ambulation, bed mobility, transfers, stair, and wheelchair mobility all as therapeutic activities. We bill all exercises under therapeutic exercises of course and then balance interventions or strategies to promote weight bearing strategies, and increased mid-line, etc. under Neuroreeducation. We've been applying high intensity gait training into our interventions as of recent and we bill that under therapeutic activity as well.

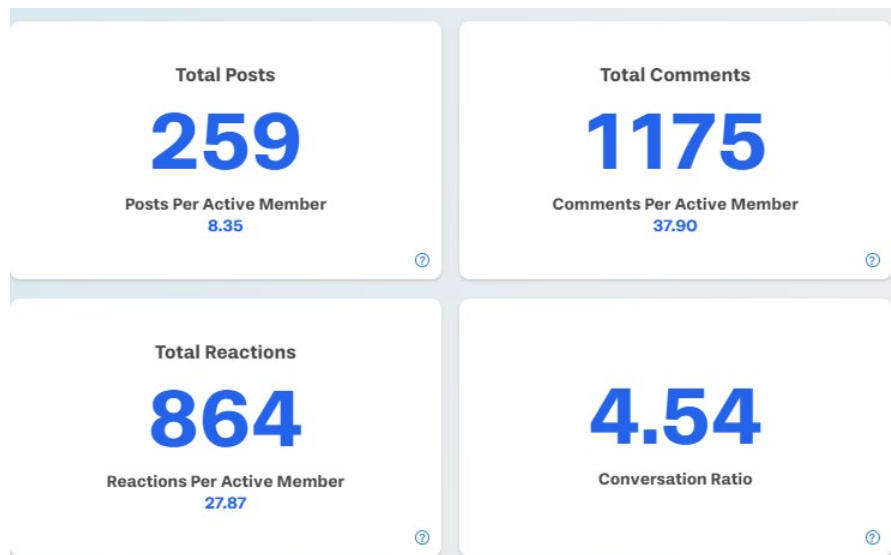

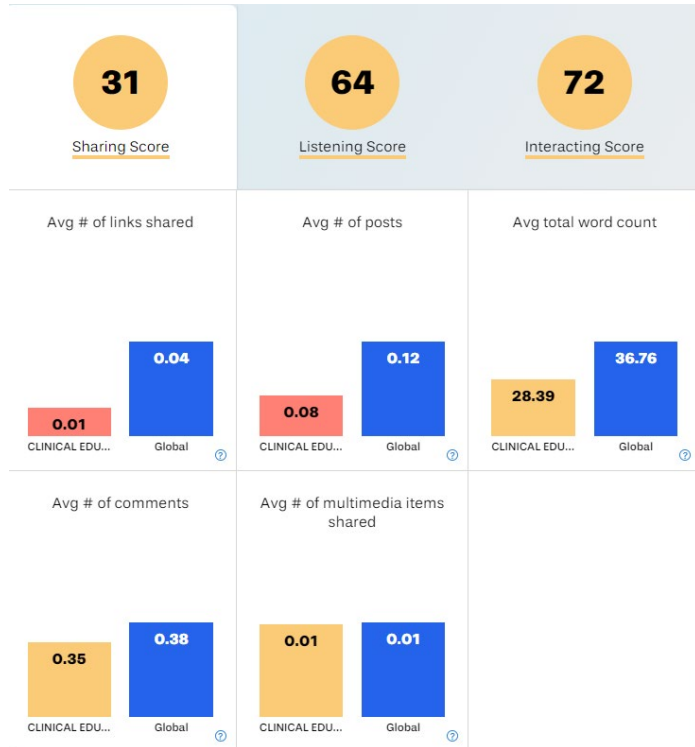

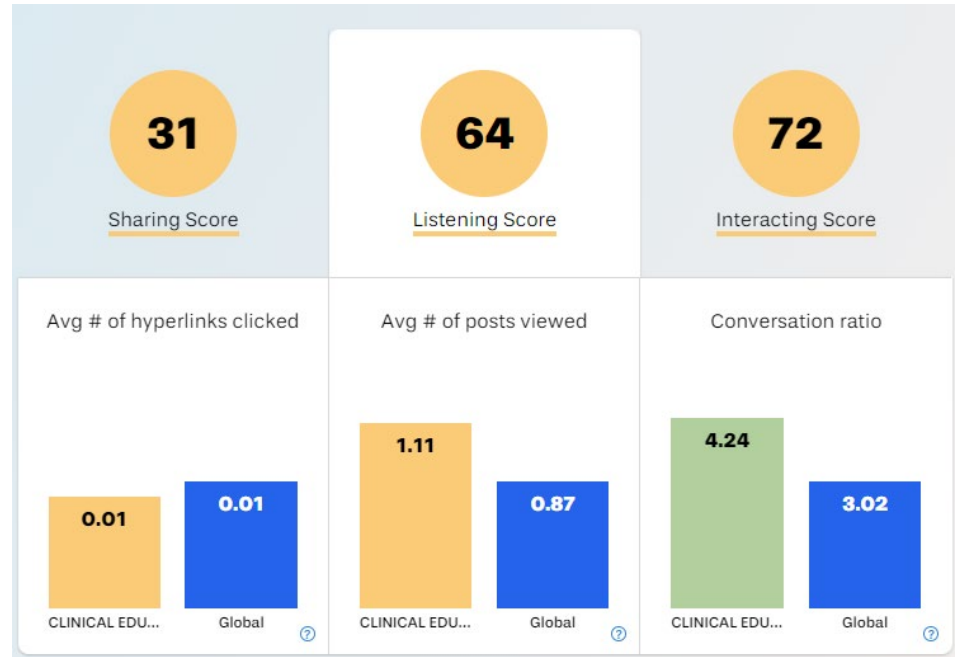
- **Sharing Score**

- **Listening Score**

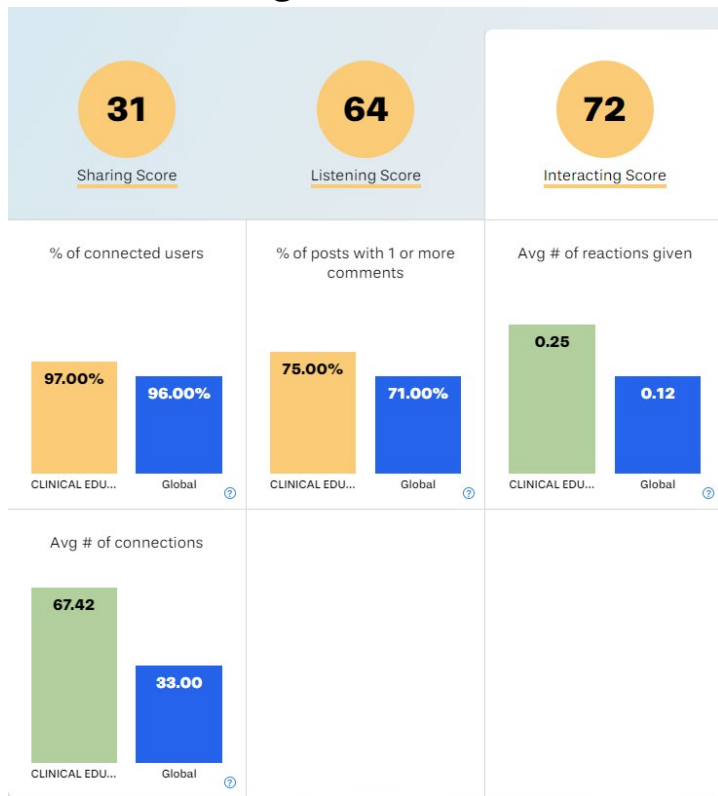
- how much students are consuming content.

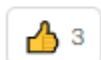

Students Connecting, Not Just “Discussing”

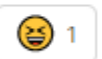
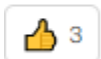
Hey everyone!

Yellowdig Student Comments: Do You Dig It?

How did Yellowdig supplement your clinical education learning experience?

- “I thought it was a **creative platform** that was more **engaging and interesting** to partake in compared to discussion boards in the past.”
- “I think Yellowdig is a better idea than the discussion board. It allows us to **speak more freely** about our experiences instead of having a post to reply to. We are able to start conversations with other classmates which **helps with our learning experience**. I also like it because we are able to **easily see if we have met our target for the week with the point system**. I think it is more interesting than the discussion post because we are **able to talk about more things** than what we are prompted to talk about which **encourages us to have more of a conversation**.”
- “... much **more engaging** than discussion boards. The layout makes it feel **like social media and less like an assignment ...**”
- “It's **nice to respond to posts about unrelated things**, such as movies and events going on in the world.”
- “I also appreciate how it seems to be a **platform mainly for the students**; it feels professional and open for people to **share their mistakes/experiences**. (but we also appreciate the DCE's for being there for us when we need it!)”

Yellowdig Student Comments: Do You Dig It?

- “I **enjoy seeing other people’s experiences** and I think because there’s not huge pressure in the requirements **we can be more authentic**. As a result I’ve learned more from this style than past discussion boards because in those situations I think most of us were more focused on giving a response that fit the requirement and were less concerned with learning from each other.”
- “I really enjoyed Yellowdig. I thought it allowed more **flexibility of discussion**. I would prefer to use it for my next clinical instead of typical discussion boards”
- “I thought Yellowdig was **much more fun** than using the original discussion post. It was **easier to view more posts quickly**, and I like that we had more **freedom to post topics** which applied to our week or related to subjects we were seeking guidance in.”
- “I liked that we were able to **share and review research articles**.”
- “It was a lot more **engaging**. I liked hearing from other classmates.”
- “It was nice to see other people going through the same things. **I didn’t feel as alone.**”

Yellowdig: The Director of Clinical Education Perspective

- “A student highlighted a piece of adaptive equipment at an inpatient rehab facility in [Virginia] that is the *only* facility in the northern hemisphere to have this piece of equipment. Not only did this student benefit from getting to experience this cutting-edge technology, but her ***classmates also got to learn*** about this equipment.”
- “Students have ***collaborated on how to improve work/life balance*** on fieldwork, ***shared resources*** they have created or received from their educators and ***brainstormed*** treatment ideas and interventions with one another.”
- “We are able to use ***examples of discussions and conversations for our reaccreditation*** evidence, so there's the added bonus of having those discussions archived.”
- Able to “observe from afar” without interfering: true ***facilitation!***
